Soukaina's project goal was to educate at-risk groups about prevention and treatment methods of HIV/Aids, to create a community of health peer educators, and to reduce the stigma surrounding HIV/AIDS.

Theatre Behind Walls by Sara (Rivka) Rocchio

Rivka's project created a theatre workshop residency program at Cook Unit on Arizona State Prison Complex-Eyman. During the workshop, inmates took drama classes to learn skills in movement, empathy, communication, acting technique, playwriting and self-expression.
